# Center Point Road Corridor Moratorium is Lifted

The 180 day Temporary Building Moratorium for the Center Point Road Corridor is lifted. After several weeks of considering the future of Hiawatha, the Moratorium Steering Committee came up with a plan to rezone the Center Point Road Corridor and create three (3) new districts referred to as CPR-1, CPR-2, and CPR-3. The new designations were assigned to coincide with the designations in the proposed zoning ordinance. For the purposes of the zoning regulations, the three (3) districts have distinct requirements. However, the districts were combined in a single section of the ordinance. The first part of the ordinance is the table of permitted, conditional, allowed and not allowed uses. For the CPR district, most of the designated uses are permitted or not allowed. In more instances, the conditional use is limited to a residential use where the conditional requirements provide an opportunity to ensure the appropriate requirements are met. The ordinance also sets the minimum yard requirements, access management standards, architectural requirements, lighting and sound restrictions and off street parking and loading provisions and lastly, setting boundaries (see Ordinance #749 and #750 for entire definitions). On August 21, 2013, The City Council held the last of the four (4) public hearings of the proposed ordinance. The previous two (2) hearings set the interpretation of regulations, established the zoning district and approved the land use regulations establishing requirements for a new zoning district along the

Center Point Road Corridor from Blairs Ferry Road to Boyson Road. The last two (2) hearings set the boundaries of those districts. Prior to the opening of the public hearing, Mayor Theis stated the following: "The rezoning before the individuals tonight will not limit you or anyone from living or running his/her business as you do today. This rezoning does not remove you or anyone from their home or business location nor does it remove you from the City. You are able to sell or lease your

property as you would today."

Theis went on to say, "The business types that are not permitted uses would be considered legal non-conforming, which is essentially a form of what others refer to as "grandfathering". Legal non-conforming allows you to continue as you do today whether that is a home or a business. For example, a natural catastrophe, fire, or tornado would come through and damage your home or business, as a legal non-conforming, the code affords you an opportunity to rebuild. Also as a legal non-conforming, you have the ability to ask for conditional expansion of your business or residence through the Planning and Zoning Commission and the Board of Adjustments. The City understands that we may not have thought of all the potential uses for the CPR zoning. It is simply not possible to come up with every possible use as new business types arise every day. Like, our current zoning ordinance, this will likely evolve and change over time. However, in the meantime, it establishes appropriate uses in the redevelopment of the Center Point Road Corridor. We have one chance to do it correctly, and we are going to do that. For those that were concerned about the location of the redevelopment of the Center Point, Robins, and Emmons Street intersection and/or nearby streets, the City will be able to tell you more in a couple of months once we complete our Capital Improvements Plan process. Any plan for the intersection is only conceptual. The City Council has not approved any plans or approved any funding for the intersection. Until Council approves the conceptual plan, and gives staff the go ahead to move forward with the intersection, it remains a conceptual plan." There were about 150 people in attendance for the public hearing in which to consider the approval of the CPR zoning. Several individuals addressed the Council with their concerns with one statement resonating in support of Neon Dragon Tattoo and why they should be allowed in the CPR zoning. Body art and tattoo parlors were not a part of the original CPR zoning as a permitted use business. Council discussed at great lengths with a decision to make a change to the rezoning to allow body art businesses in all three (3) new zoning districts located along Center Point Road, between Blairs Ferry and Boyson Road. The Council moved ahead with the Ordinance #750, but set a September 4th public hearing to amend the language to vote on including tattoo parlors in CPR-1, CPR-2, and CPR-3.

#### **Heart Saver Award Presentation**

At approximately 1:46 a.m. on June 22, 2013, a Hiawatha resident called 911 to report her roommate might be having a heart attack. The Hiawatha Ambulance and Hiawatha Police Officers were dispatched to the scene. Two Hiawatha Officers, Sgt. Trent MacTaggart and Officer Erik Naaktgeboren, arrived within three (3) minutes of the call being placed. Sgt. MacTaggart and Officer Naaktgeboren found the patient unconscious, lacking a pulse, and not breathing. The officers quickly worked as a team, analyzed the scene and connected the patient to an Automated External Defibrillator (AED). A shock was advised and delivered to the patient followed by CPR. The Hiawatha Ambulance arrived shortly after, continuing CPR and lifesaving measures. The patient was transported to a local hospital



where additional lifesaving measures were administered. Amazingly, the patient Randal Mittman, walked out of the hospital several days later. Carol Fridal of the American Heart Association attended the August 7th City Council meeting to present a Heart Saver Rescue Award to Sgt. MacTaggart and Officer Naaktgeboren. Mr. Mittman was present to place medals on the two officers who saved his life and expressed his sincere appreciation to all those who attended to him on June 22nd. The City of Hiawatha is committed to providing the best possible first responders and equipment. The City currently maintains AED's in City Hall, the city maintenance shop, the library, police cars, as well as all ambulances.

# Local Option Sales and Service Tax Vote: November 5, 2013

On November 5, 2013, the citizens of Hiawatha and the Metro area will decide whether or not to extend the 1% Local Option Sales and Service Tax (LOSST) for a period of 10 years.

The 1% local option sales and service tax is not a new tax; it is currently in effect and has been since July 1, 2010. This vote is asking the citizens' permission to reauthorize an extension of the current local option sales tax in order to pay for needed infrastructure projects and support economic development in this growing and maturing community.

Anybody (resident or visitor), who buys goods and services within Linn County, pays this local option sales and service tax and contributes to the total amount of revenue that is raised. The local sales and service tax is paid for by purchases made by millions of annual visitors and the number of daily workers that buy products in Linn County.

The local option sales and service tax provides an additional funding source for the City to undertake some critical projects which have benefited our community. Many of those projects either might not be able to be constructed without sales tax funding, would be delayed for many years, or which would otherwise cause increases in local property taxes. Our current LOSST dollars have provided funding for needed street and sewer replacement, street and sewer upgrades, replacing obsolete public safety vehicles, repair and maintenance of City buildings plus allowing purchasing of equipment in order to reduce operating costs, all of which divert expenses from the City operating budget, which is property tax funded.

We have spent \$1,912,137.54 on such projects. The pie chart to the right demonstrates the percentage of those dollars spent in each department.


If the referendum is approved, the process will start to get many projects ready for construction very quickly. However, not all of the projects categories and projects will be underway or commenced immediately. Timing will be dependent on a number of factors, such as cash flow from the sales tax, the length of time of the design process and others. These dollars would help support a future library expansion, a satellite fire station and other facility improvements, replace aging water, sewer and street infrastructures, park improvements and additions, replacement and purchase of safety equipment. There are several small street and utility projects in our current capital improvement plan that are scheduled in future years that the LOSST funds would help move up in their construction and lessen the burden on our debt service levy.

On August 21, 2013, the City Council passed a resolution authorizing the imposition of a local sales and service tax at the rate of 1% to be effective July 1, 2014 until June 30, 2024. The City of Hiawatha elected the following:

# Help Hiawatha Fire put a Lid on Kitchen Fires!

Cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and fire injuries in the United States. In 2011, cooking was involved in an estimated 156,300 home fires and caused 470 deaths, 5,390 injuries, and \$1 billion in property losses (Source: National Fire Protection Association). Many of these fires would be prevented simply by people paying attention when they cook. For example, many fires are caused when food is left unattended, particularly when frying. If you must leave, even for a short time, turn off the stove. If you are sleepy, or under the influence of alcohol, avoid using the stove. A common scenario is a person comes home after a night out and heats oil to fry a snack. They fall asleep and a fire starts. Keep flammable materials such as food packages or dish towels a safe distance from the stove. Finally, avoid wearing loose clothing that can come into contact with the burner or flame of a stove causing a person to set their clothes on fire, creating serious injury.

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If you do have a stove fire, the best advice is turn the stove off, and "Put a lid on it". Covering the fire will smother the flames. Never try to pick up a burning pan, and NEVER PUT WATER ON A GREASE FIRE. If your clothes catch on fire, stop, drop and roll. As

always, a smoke detector and a family exit plan are your best defense should a fire start.

October is Fire Prevention Month, and the Hiawatha Fire Department will be focusing on preventing cooking fires and checking smoke alarms. #### Water Department's New Municipal Well

The Water Department awarded a contract to Shawver Well Company, Inc., from Fredericksburg, Iowa to drill a new municipal water well at a cost of \$114,500. The well is being drilled at 2910 Fitzroy Road, on land that was purchased from Forrest Kramer. The well is 500 feet deep, drilled down into the Silurian aquifer; this well should produce approximately 300 to 350 Gallons Per Minute.

The water quality will be approximately the same as our other municipal wells. The Water

Department is planning on bringing this well online by midsummer next year.
