PHASE 1 OF FIRE STATION 1 REMODEL COMPLETE

The phase 1 remodel of the fire station was recently completed. This remodel added individual bedrooms for our first responders that stay overnight at the fire station. Prior to the remodel, all the responders slept in an open dorm style room with fold down beds. This setup offered no privacy for the men and women, and it disrupted sleep as a result of comings and goings during the night or early in the morning.

The project added 6 individual bedrooms, an additional shower stall, and remodeled the kitchen. The bedrooms were constructed in the areas that used to be the training room and the day room. Phase 2 remodel of the current station will be completed after completion of Fire Station 2. The Phase 2 remodel will add a small meeting room, and work room and it will expand the fitness area. The members are excited for the completion of the project and have expressed appreciation for the private bedroom.

TIPS



INSTALL & TEST ALARMS

IT'S NOT OVER YET! ARE YOU PREPARED FOR WINTER DRIVING?

Winter driving conditions can be chilling. The Iowa State Patrol and Hiawatha Police Department recommend these 7 tips as you take to the roads this season:

- 1. **Keep windshields clear** Scrape snow and ice to ensure full visibility.
- 2. **Be patient** Allow more time and daylight if possible to get to your destination, and remember that detouring through a median typically causes problems.
- 3. Always pay attention to the road Traffic flow can change instantly and braking times increase dramatically with snow or ice.
- 4. Add braking time to exit freeways and interstates Exits and overpasses get slick during winter events and require even more braking
- 5. Know when not to use cruise control Don't use cruise control on snow and ice conditions.
- 6. Prepare a winter survival kit Pack the items listed to help you endure an emergency or road closure until help arrives.
- 7. Turn on headlights It's critical to be seen on snowy and foggy days.































HIAWATHA ANNUAL PERMIT REPORT: 2022

2022 building permits ended on a high note with the highest ever December permit valuations at \$3.12 million. This capped off the third highest year in 10 years at \$41.6 million in construction valuations, with permit fees exceeding \$283,000 for the year.

The year included the greatest number of new single-family dwellings since tracking began in 2008 at 35 new homes. The strong construction year also included 6 new commercial buildings valued at \$33 million; a valuation \$4 million above 2021 and the highest on record for a single year in Hiawatha!

FISCAL 2023 YEAR TO DATE

The fiscal report indicates FY 2023 is tracking just above the 10-year average. Since July 1st, Hiawatha has issued permits for valuations in excess of \$20 million. However, the development fees are not showing as much activity as in 2021. This is only the second year for tracking development fees.

COMPREHENSIVE PLAN CONSIDERATION: UPDATED SCHEDULE

The City of Hiawatha appointed a committee to evaluate and update the Comprehensive Plan 2036 to:

- Update the vision and mission statements
- Reflect the new standards for healthy neighborhoods of diversity, inclusion and equity
- Enhance Sustainability and Environmental language
- Update the Future Land Use Map
- Add action plan goals to reflect the new amendments

The committee has completed their work and recommended adoption of the new amendments as proposed. The updated plan recommendations were scheduled for January but due to the complexity of the updates will be heard by the Planning and Zoning Commission on February 27, 2023 to consider a recommendation to Council. The agenda for the meeting has been published on the city website: https://www.hiawatha-iowa.com/government/board-and-commissions/ The City Council public hearing is now scheduled for March 1, 2023 at their regularly scheduled Council meeting. Public notice will be published as required by State Statute.



VACANT BUILDING ORDINANCE

In 2022 the City of Hiawatha adopted its "Vacant and Neglected Building Ordinance" to address the issue of dilapidated buildings as the City ages. The ordinance outlines a process to facilitate the removal or repair of existing abandoned buildings in order to maintain a safe and beautiful community.

In 2023, a program to eliminate these structures through repair or demolition will begin. The vacant and neglected building program establishes;

- Specific standards for vacant and abandoned building exterior appearances
- Specific standards for vacant and abandoned buildings for interior safety and sanitation
- Specific demolition requirements for non-compliance within a specified time frame
- Registration fees to recover administrative and inspection costs
- Penalty fees to act as a deterrent to maintaining noncompliant vacant buildings

Implementation of a vacant building ordinance will put the city in a proactive position rather than a reactive position. This program provides a policy and plan for reducing the blight caused by abandoned properties and provide a framework for immediately addressing severely damaged property due to a natural disaster such as a derecho. The timely elimination of the abandoned and neglected property will prevent the City from having to address the buildings as nuisances, which can be costly in human resources, financial resources and extended time frames to achieve corrections.

As a first step, the City will contact property owners of vacant and neglected buildings and include forms and documents for building registration in the program and for eventual elimination of the nuisance. The City will then work with the owners toward compliance with the standard. The ordinance includes options for rehabilitating a building and options for demolition. The enforcement process is to remove or repair a vacant and neglected building within one year of notification. If no progress is made, the City may intervene and eliminate the vacant building by demolition, assessing the property owner for all costs. The ultimate goal for this ordinance is facilitate keeping Hiawatha safe and beautiful.



Libraries Promote Literacy

Libraries are committed to helping children and adults develop the skills needed to survive and thrive in a global information society. The ability to read and use computers are at the forefront of these skills.

Basic, functional literacy is an essential skill for personal and professional growth. It is also essential to a full, beneficial use of a library's services and programs. However, 130 million American adults have low literacy skills according to the American Public Media Research Lab.

The implications of these statistics are alarming. Many adults cannot identify a specific location on a map, complete a job application or an insurance form, understand the instructions on a medicine bottle, or effectively help their children with homework. With a long tradition of providing resources and services for individuals who want to improve their reading and writing skills, libraries are committed to helping people enhance and improve their learning literacy skills to live a fuller life.

2023 PROJECTS AND BEYOND

Street Improvements – City staff is working to complete construction plans for Nixon Dr, Rainbow Blvd, Marion St and 3rd Ave. All of these projects are likely to be completed between May and August assuming the city receives favorable bids.

- Nixon Dr from Northwood Dr north 325 feet will include replacement of sidewalk and a new asphalt overlay on the street
- Rainbow Blvd from 12th Ave to 14th Ave will include a new asphalt overlay and new ADA ramps at 13th Ave.
- Marion St from 2nd Ave to 4th Ave will include a new asphalt overlay.
- 3rd Ave from Marion St south to the dead end will include some new curb and gutter and a new asphalt overlay.
- Northwood Dr The city is working with Shive-Hattery Engineers to complete the design of a new storm sewer from Robins Rd to the existing drainage way approximately 850 feet to the east, as well as a new sidewalk from Robins Road to Nixon Drive. Staff anticipates design to be completed in March with construction between May and August. A Public Information meeting was held January 10 at City Hall with staff and consultants receiving feedback on the initial design. Staff is working with the consultant on addressing concerns.

Future projects include:

- Public Works Cold Storage Building complete design and construct a new 50'x120' building at the Public Works site. Anticipated construction starting spring 2023
- Fire Station No. 2 complete design of a new 18,000 sqft fire station to be constructed at the intersection of Stamy Rd and Metzger Dr. The City will be working closely with a construction manager and the architect to start construction as early as May 2023 with a completion date of June 2024.
- Turtle Creek Park Staff is working on a plan to install a
 2-stall restroom building with pavilion at the new
 playground and splashpad area. Staff is anticipating this
 work to be completed by the fall of 2023.

Hiawatha History Commission



Pictured is the bell of the Hiawatha Optimist Club, chartered in 1957. Their Valentine's Day Dance was the first official youth activity in the building purchased by the Optimists in 1964. \$6,000 was paid for the concrete block building on Emmons Street across the street from the current City Hall. Later, the same building was used for the Hiawatha Library until its roof collapsed in 1982.



MILITARY AND VETERAN BANNER PROGRAM INFORMATION



The City of Hiawatha is proud to announce an initiative to honor those who are serving or have served in the United States Armed Forces.

The Military and Veteran Banner Program is intended to honor and show appreciation for past and present military personnel along with their families. Each banner will display the honoree's name, branch, and years of service along with the names of those honoring them.

QUALIFICATIONS

In order to purchase a banner, one of the following qualifications must be met:

- The honoree is an active duty member of the United States Armed Forces
- The honoree is a retired or honorably discharged member of the United States Armed Forces who is, or did, reside in Hiawatha, or who once resided in Hiawatha and is now deceased
- The applicant is a current resident or business based in Hiawatha

BANNERS

Each banner will be 30" x 63" and printed double-sided and in full color. Each banner will be customized with a photo of the honoree which is provided by the applicant. There is a limit of one honoree per banner.

Banners will be displayed on light poles along Center Point Road in Hiawatha with the help of our Public Works Department. They will be displayed from Memorial Day until Veterans Day in 2023 and then again in 2024.

There is a limit of 50 banners for the first year of the program. These banners will be sold on a first-come, first-served basis. Your banner is not reserved until we receive payment.

Upon removal of the banner after the second year, Hiawatha City Staff will make all efforts to give the banner to the honoree or the applicant for their personal use. The City of Hiawatha will not be responsible for replacing banners that are stolen, damaged, or destroyed due to weather, age, vandalism, or any act of nature beyond our control.



COST AND DEADLINE

Each banner costs \$125 which covers the purchase of the banner and installation for two years. The deadline to submit an application for a banner is March 6, 2023, or until availability runs out.
