EMS week is a time to recognize all the Paramedics, Advanced EMTs, EMTs, and First Responders who have risen to the challenge time and time again to respond to the needs of our patients and our community. The Hiawatha Fire Department has a dedicated crew of 15 Paramedics, 2 Advanced EMTs, and 19 EMTs. Our crew consists of both paid staff and volunteers who donate their time to serve our community. In 2022, these dedicated EMS providers responded to 2,569 calls for service, and treated 2,180 patients with a wide variety of illnesses and injuries. Our EMS providers do more than just respond to calls for service. They also help to provide CPR, First Aid, and Stop the Bleed training to the city staff, businesses, and members of the community. They participate in community events and teach kids about fire and life safety at our schools as well. Our dedicated EMS providers spend a lot of time training on their skills and learning about new evidence-based treatments to make sure that they are ready for your emergency when you call 9-1-1. At all hours of the day, these dedicated EMS professionals show up to provide the best care and service to the citizens and businesses of Hiawatha. Join us this week in celebrating the hard work and dedication that our crews put in to serve our community.

# May 8, 2023 • 7:00 AM

### Have items placed at the curb before 7:00 AM

#### ALLOWED:

- Broken glass placed in a plastic bucket or other suitable container. Windows and doors with broken glass will not be collected.
- Small items placed in trash cans or plastic bags. Mark trash cans with an "X" if they are to be discarded
- Large items such as furniture, mattresses, doors, beds, tires, chairs, toilets, etc.
- Please cut railroad ties, plastic, lumber, carpet and drywall in no larger than 4' or less lengths and tie in bundles. No large demolition project debris. Remove nails and screws from lumber, trim, drywall, etc.
- Metal and appliances need to be placed curbside separate from other items as they will be collected by a different crew.

#### NOT ALLOWED:

- Waste oil & solvents
- Batteries
- Deposit beverage containers
- Pressurized tanks
- Cans with undried paint
- Cardboard
- Florescent bulbs
- TV's and computer monitors

#### **BUILDING SAFETY MONTH**

As we celebrate building safety month, sponsored by the International Code Council, we would like to recognize the staff of the building department in Hiawatha who work tirelessly with all members of the construction industry, design professionals and property owners to assure our buildings are safe, sanitary and sustainable for our citizens to live, work and play in beautiful Hiawatha.

#### ANOTHER GOOD NEIGHBOR POLICY: OUTSIDE STORAGE

One of our business owners affectionately refers to our city as "Beautiful Hiawatha" in their advertising campaigns. The visual aesthetics of our cityscape is one of the values espoused in our Comprehensive Plan and reflected in our ordinances.

Our Comprehensive Plan references visual elements in the Land Use Section, Quality of Life Section and the Community Character Section. All of these items point to detailed landscaping requirements, building designs and site aesthetics which enhance the beauty of Hiawatha. Items include specified building materials, night sky lighting, green space and, screening of storage and garage areas. This is evidence we care deeply about how our city looks.

Consequently, we have put in place ordinances which reflect this concern especially regarding outside storage, garbage and junk vehicles. It is generally accepted no outside storage is permitted unless specifically allowed in an ordinance and no junk vehicle is allowed except in specifically designated parking areas. The regulations differ between commercial property and residential property.

Outside stored materials which are classified as garbage, trash, solid waste and junk vehicles are specifically prohibited and are considered a nuisance. (Hiawatha Ordinance Chapter 50, 51 and Hiawatha Property Maintenance Code Chapter 164) These items are to be properly contained, removed from all property and properly disposed. Additionally, all dumpsters and waste storage areas for commercial property are to be surrounded by an enclosure. (Hiawatha Ordinance Chapter 106)

Outside storage not described above is regulated in our Unified Development Code (UDC) Chapter 165. This section of the code prohibits storage of any kind; including junk vehicles, in the front yard of a residential property. Further, all outside stored materials are to be properly screened.

#### 165.23 (9) C. Parking and Storage Restrictions.

(7) Outside Storage. Outside storage shall not be permitted in any required yard. Outside storage shall not be permitted in any front yard in a Residential District. All outside storage shall be effectively screened with landscaping and building elements or opaque fences or walls from the right of way and from off-site views......

When we accumulate more "stuff" than we can hope to store within our residence, garage, and storage buildings, we must keep our neighbors and the wellbeing of our city in mind. If you need to store items outside, remember this good neighbor policy. Eliminate any unnecessary outside storage and properly screen the stored items which cannot be eliminated. Help us keep "Beautiful Hiawatha" beautiful!





#### TREE CITY USA GROWTH AWARD

The City of Hiawatha was recently honored with the 2022 Tree City USA Growth Award at the 32nd Annual Community Forestry Awards Luncheon in Ankeny. The award was presented by the Arbor Day Foundation and the Iowa Department of Natural Resources April 12th at the FFA Enrichment Center in Ankeny.

"The Tree City USA award is a symbol for communities who have made a commitment to the management of public trees," says state forester Jeff Goerndt. "Your community has provided an outstanding example for other Iowa communities by enhancing our forest resources and demonstrating the great value of trees in providing multiple benefits for future generations."

Hiawatha was one of 20 lowa communities to qualify for Tree City USA Growth status. To receive the award, a city must, at a minimum, provide education and public relations; partnerships; planning and management; and tree planting and maintenance in their communities.

Cold Storage Facility – Public Works is looking to construct a new 120'x50' building on the west side of the Public Works site. This building will be used to enclose machines and equipment that are not used on a daily basis to help open up space within the main facility. In addition, there will be a 50'x50' area of the building that will be used to store rock, sand and cold mix asphalt for use during the winter months in the case of a water main break. This building was bid in late April. Construction should begin in June with a December completion date.

Turtle Creek Park Upgrades – City council approved plans to install a new preconstructed precast concrete restroom and a 20'x34' pavilion at the newly constructed playground and splashpad. The new restroom will have two unisex bathrooms with automatic timers for door locks. The pavilion is a steel structure with a steel roof. Staff will be working with a utility contractor in early May to install new sanitary sewer and water main on the west side of the park. In addition, staff will be excavating and placing the footings for the restroom and pavilion during the summer months in anticipation of the precast restroom structure arriving in early fall for placement. Orange construction fence will be placed around the construction zone. Users of the park should use caution. In addition to the new restroom and pavilion, new parking lot lights will be installed in the two islands during the months of May and June. These lights will automatically turn on from dusk to dawn.

#### SENSUS WATER METER READING SYSTEM

The Hiawatha Water Department uses Sensus water meters to register the amount of water consumed by users. Over the years, these meters have been updated and improved to keep the most accurate meter readings. Hiawatha has always had the best interest of its customers and that includes what kind of meter reading system we are using to track usage.

The Sensus Iperl water meter tracks the amount of water used in gallons. Actually, to be exact, 100 gallons of usage. Meaning, for most residential and commercial customers, the meter registers every 100 gallons of water used.

To read the water meters, Hiawatha has gone from manual readings, which I am sure many of you remember having to manually read your water meter and mail that reading in with your water payment? To an AMR (Automated Meter Reading) system which required the installation of a meter reading device called an MXU to the outside of your home that is connected through a conduit to your water meter. This was quite the update as our Water Operators could then drive by your home, click a button on a handheld device, and collect the reading to be downloaded back in the water office.

Now today, we have yet again upgraded to the best reading software with SA (Sensus Analytics) FlexNet reading system which allows the office staff to read your meter in real time through the Sensus computer software. So, no need for the Water Operators to spend hours driving around the city to collect meter readings. The office can do in with a click of a button through the FlexNet MXU device on the outside of your home. This also means if we need to research high consumption, zero consumption or trends in your water usage, we can do just that from the SA software right here in the office. It is amazing how much technology is evolving every day. We are sure excited to be a part of a community that is always reaching for that something better to give our customers the best service we can.

We are actively working on getting appointments with the last few sections of town needing either an updated Iperl water meter or an updated FlexNet MXU. If you have any questions give our office a call a 319-393-5556. We would be happy to answer any questions you may have.
