The Hiawatha Business Summit, held February 27, was a resounding success, drawing a large turnout for business owners looking to build effective marketing and get a good return on that investment.

The first series of the 2024 quarterly summit was sponsored by the Hiawatha Economic Development Corporation (HEDCO) and the Cedar Rapids Metro Economic Alliance. The summit was held at Metro Studios, 1350 Sherman Road, Hiawatha. Metro is a marketing and advertising agency that helps many businesses, from small to large companies (Fortune 1000). They work in the digital marketing space, on social media, build and market websites, help create content and manage traditional marketing plans that include TV commercials, outdoor advertising and radio ads.

Kirk Hayden, VP and owner of Metro is a ten-year member of the HEDCO board. Metro Studios started 39 years ago in eastern lowa and built their current studio in Hiawatha.

"And I can tell you it's been an amazing venture and adventure for us being in Hiawatha over the past 24 years or so," Hayden said. "Hiawatha is a great place to do business and continue to do business and grow."

Metro's presentation was titled, "Are You Wasting Your Marketing Dollars?" Metro's staff explained the intricacies of marketing, with a particular focus on identifying the right digital platforms to maximize measurable success. The presenters said that many businesses construct a marketing plan that doesn't align with their audience or uplift their product, and can lose dollars doing that.

The digital marketing strategists told the audience, made up of business people from Hiawatha, Cedar Rapids and Marion, that results should show a good return on investment. They gave examples of what kind of marketing plan might be best for light manufacturing versus a technology company. They explained the many ways to measure effectiveness and how to break down those digital measurements by tracking "clicks" or "impressions."

The Metro Studios staff also talked about how people search for products or businesses on the internet, using Google search, and the difference between organic searches and paid sponsorships.

They cited data that showed that website design is extremely important - 94% of first impressions are made from a company's website design. They also showed that 54% of website traffic comes from a mobile device and a company's website needs to be visual and adaptive to those devices. The next Hiawatha Business Summit is May 21 at Prairiewoods and will focus on health care issues in the workplace. #### **ANOTHER GOOD NEIGHBOR POLICY**

**PUBLIC NOTICE:** In accordance with City Ordinance section 50.08 this article shall serve as notice to all property owners. Failure to control weeds and grass may result in further action by the city without further notice from May 1st through September 1st. The Hiawatha City ordinance 50.02 (10) requires property owners to keep grasses mowed so that grass and weeds are less than 8 inches in height. This includes the individual lot, along with parking adjacent thereto, alleys, public ways or areas up to the centerline of said ways.

By maintaining the grass and weeds to the required height it will help eliminate certain health and safety concerns. An additional benefit to proper lawn maintenance is the enhancement of our storm water management.

- Grass and weeds should be kept at 8" or less. The
  recommended grass length is 3". When your lawn is 3" tall, it
  allows water more time to absorb into the soil versus running
  into the street or onto the sidewalk and towards the storm
  drains.
- Grass clippings should never go into the street.
  - This clogs storm and drains and affects the quality of our water and,
  - o creates a serious safety hazard for cyclists.
- Direct downspouts away from paved surfaces. All drainage needs to be dispersed on your own property. This helps to prevent pollutants such as motor oil or detergent from entering our water sources.

#### **EXERCISE YOUR WATER VALVES**

Another good reminder for our water customers is to exercise the valves near your water meter this spring. Typically, you will find two valves. One on either side of the meter. The valves are there to isolate the water meter, should there be a need to remove it or replace it. The valves are also there in the event you should experience some kind of a water leak within your property. Should you find yourself in this circumstance you can close either valve to stop the leak from continuing. Hopefully, by doing this, you are preventing property loss and a higher water bill due to a leak after the water meter. Closing the valves slowly and reopening them will keep the passage ways clear allowing for proper closure and sealing. Exercising these valves could prevent them from seizing up or malfunctioning when you need them most.

The Water Department can also assist in locating your curb stop and turning it off to stop the flow of water when you have an emergency water leak within your home or business. However, when these circumstances happen outside work hours it could take some time to get an individual to your location to assist you along with an after-hours charge. But, with properly exercised water valves an issue could be resolved sooner with less cost.

#### 12th Avenue & Boyson Road Schedule

Construction is set to begin on Monday, April 1 at the intersection of 12th Ave and Boyson Rd. The contractor will begin with temporary lane widening on the south side of the road as well as temporary access driveways to Junge Automotive and Toyota dealerships. After the temporary pavement has been placed, the north half of Boyson Road will be closed with all traffic shifting to the south. This will allow the contractor to construct the north half of the roundabout and connection to North 12th Avenue. This phase is expected to be completed around June 14. Once the north half has been completed, the south side of the roadway will begin construction. Phase 2 is expected to be completed by August 30. All final tie-ins and completion of the project should be completed by October 11.


#### Boyson Road from Hawkeye Drive to Robins Road





# **AMNESTY DAY**

## ITEMS MUST BE PLACED BY THE **CURB BEFORE 7:00 AM ON MAY 6**

Hiawatha's citywide amnesty day is intended to assist residents by hauling away items that are not normally picked up by their regular garbage haulers. Please read the updated requirements listed below carefully. These are designed to speed up the process and increase the safety of our staff. Photos provided illustrate examples of how piles should and should not be organized for pick-up. Staff will collect items that go to the landfill first, then come back to pick-up steel and appliances. New this year, homes that do not meet requirements will receive a notice on their front door stating why items were not collected. Please recycle all items that can be recycled.

#### ALLOWED:

- Broken glass placed in a plastic bucket or other suitable container. Windows and doors with broken glass will not be collected.
- Small items placed in trash cans or plastic bags. Mark trash cans with an "X" if they are to be discarded. 40lb weight limit.
- Large items such as furniture, mattresses, doors, beds, tires, chairs, toilets, etc.
- Please cut railroad ties, plastic, lumber, carpet and drywall in 4' or less lengths and tie in bundles. No demolition project debris. Remove nails and screws from lumber, trim, drywall, etc.
- Metal and appliances need to be placed curbside separate from other items as they will be collected by a different crew.
- · Refrigerators and freezers must be cleaned out prior to pick-up.

#### NOT ALLOWED:

- · Waste oil & solvents
- Batteries
- Deposit beverage containers
- · Pressurized tanks
- Cans with undried paint
- Cardboard
- Florescent bulbs
- Demolition project debris
- TV's, Computer monitors & other electronics (take these to Earth Day on April 20)
