The City of Hiawatha understands the importance and benefits of its parks and open space system. As a City we are committed to providing the recreational needs of current and future residents. Parks and open space provide a safe and healthy place to lay, all while beautifying and protecting the natural environment of the area. In Fall of 2018, Hiawatha City Council and the Park Board approved City staff to update the current Comprehensive Plan with MSA Professional Services, Inc. This plan will provide an updated vision for the future growth of the community including a section devoted to parks and recreation. The previous plan was adopted in 2010 and much has changed since it was written. That document has served the community to its potential,

so an updated vision is needed to undertake the upcoming opportunities of the next 10 years.

By updating this plan, it provides current insight into the existing conditions of the parks as well as concepts for a new 18-acre park in the North West part of Hiawatha that the City acquired this past year. The purpose of the plan is to guide the continual improvement of the City's parks and recreation areas and direct policy for parks and open space. It predicts a connected system of parks and open spaces throughout the community and provides a framework to guide long and short-term decision making and investments in the system.

The Hiawatha Parks and Recreation Vision Plan complements the directions established in the Hiawatha 2036 Comprehensive Plan, and provides detailed guidance on the development, managements and operations of the park system. The direction is also based on the community's expressed needs and desires from public engagement throughout the planning process.

The planning effort kicked off in September of 2018, and represents input gathered from the community, stakeholders, and City staff over the following eight months. Four hundred plus people participated in an online survey, crowd-source map applications, focus group meetings, and a public open house community meeting helped guide the development of this plan by providing valuable citizen input. Oversite for the project was provided by the City's Park and Recreation Director as well as the Steering Committee for this project. Meetings between the Steering Committee and the consultant provided input for the plan's content throughout the four phases of the project.

April 1, 2019, a Public Meeting was held in the multi-purpose room at City Hall where MSA Professionals facilitated a meeting and presented information from the community survey, focus groups and information about Parks and Recreation in the Hiawatha Community. Display boards

the information collected, ask questions and write comments. MSA presented a 20-minute presentation on Hiawatha's current trends, public usage and needs. A North West territory park concept was displayed showing residents the potential for the City's new park based on feedback from the different phases within this study. It was a great chance for residents to help the planning committee collect any last comments before the completion of 2029 Comprehensive Park and Recreation Plan. The City of Hiawatha has determined Robins Road is a key component of the creation of a

"downtown" within the community and is in need of public improvements. To address these issues a study has been commissioned to plan the revitalization of the area along Robins Road from Boyson Road to the new intersection at North Center Point Road. The scope of the study includes:


- Gateway Entrance Features
- Pedestrian and Bicycle Accommodations
- Urban Renewal Concepts
 - * Delineating future land uses based on trends that may need to be accommodated along the corridor to promote a more robust economy and development pattern.
 - * Defining a variety of land uses and creating guidelines that fit these uses into the corridor in a harmonious and supportive way.
 - * Detailing how buildings interact with fronting and side streets for our Design Guidelines including the scale, massing, and form of various building typologies based on land use, density, urban form, and position along the corridor.
 - * Addressing how properties work together to help access management and parking issues.
 - * Promoting landscape design to create a higher level of place, character, environmental sustainability, stormwater management and urban heat island mitigation.
 - * Providing for more walkable and mixed use patterns where appropriate.
 - * Accommodating and promoting opportunities for gateway properties.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION AND INPUT: The study process includes a steering committee made up of the general public, affected property owners, elected officials and city staff who have been meeting monthly with design representatives from Bolton & Menk. This group has provided feedback and direction to the design team.

Along with the steering committee input, opportunities for the general public interaction have been created through public meetings and internet availability. The introductory open house was in December and the progress open house was in February with a final plan recommendation to be presented on May 16, 2019 from 5:00 PM to 7:00 PM in the lower level of Hiawatha City Hall. Hiawatha Approves Contract for 12th Avenue Reconstruction Project

The City Council approved an engineering contract to prepare a project that will reconstruct 12th Avenue from Blairs Ferry Road to just south of Lyndhurst Avenue. The intent is to add a new asphalt surface to the existing street and replace the current sidewalk ramps at six intersections with new concrete ramps meeting ADA guidelines.

MSA Professional Services will review the current street condition and determine the best process to improve the street surface. As the design progresses, a public input meeting will be scheduled to notify the local residents of the construction schedule and possible traffic detours that will be required to complete the project.

Hiawatha moves forward with Willman Street Signal Project



The City Council approved an engineering contract to prepare a project that will install traffic signals at the Willman Street intersection with Center Point Road. The intersection currently controlled with a four-way stop after the completion of the new Emmons Street/Robins Road intersection. The intent is to add new traffic signals that will only be activated with a vehicle or pedestrian call from

Willman Street. The latest plan is to replace the entire intersection with new colored concrete and reconstruct sidewalk and bike trail ramps to meet current ADA standards.

Shive Hattery Engineers will design both plans to bid the traffic signal equipment and the reconstruction of the intersection. The project will be funded using Local Option Sales and Service Tax and is scheduled to be completed by Fall of 2019.

Grant Award

At the March 27, 2019 Iowa Park and Recreation Spring Conference, the Friends of Hiawatha Park and Recreation Foundation were awarded a grant of \$1,000 for park equipment updates at Tucker Park. This summer Tucker Park will receive a face lift on outdated equipment in our toddler area. The new equipment will feature a new 2-5 year old

structure that has all-inclusive components, musical play, hands on features and creative panels for children with disabilities to play. The Hiawatha Parks and Recreation Friends Foundation additionally donated \$13,000 towards this project and will provide volunteers to assist with the install. The local HiCREW Kiwanis Club has also agreed to commit \$1,000. With the support from these three organizations, this project is 90% funded by nonprofits. We are excited for this project to take place and grateful for the support we have in our community!

Save a Life on April 27

The Hiawatha Fire Department is teaming up with the American Red Cross and local volunteers to install free smoke alarms in select areas of the city. This is part of a national movement to save lives in fire vulnerable neighborhoods. Alarms will also be installed in Marion and Cedar Rapids on the same day.

Fire Department officials have been participating in regular planning meetings to ensure a successful opportunity to save lives in our community. If you feel you need a smoke alarm and cannot afford one or need help installing one, visit **getasmokealarm.org** to request assistance from the Red Cross. Arrangements will be made to install your alarms on a future date.

On Saturday, April 27, volunteers will be knocking on doors in specific neighborhoods to offer the free alarms. They will install up to three alarms in a home, check existing alarms to ensure they work, and replace dead batteries where necessary. Firefighters are reminding the public that smoke alarms that are more than ten years old, should be replaced. The 3-person installation team will also offer fire safety education to all occupants of the home and leave materials with residents for planning a fire escape route.

Residents who would like to be part of the effort to save lives by installing these alarms can volunteer to be on an installation team. To register, go to soundthealarm.org. Click on volunteer, enter your zip code, and select the Cedar Rapids project. Volunteers will meet at 9:00 AM at Cedar Rapids First Assembly Church (3233 Blairs Ferry Road NE, Cedar Rapids) to gather supplies and be assigned to a team.

On April 20, youth volunteers will hang door tags and set out yard signs in neighborhoods where volunteers will be offering alarms on the 27th. If you see the tags and signs, you know you can expect friendly Red Cross and partner volunteers in your neighborhood between 10:00 AM and 2:00 PM that Saturday. Volunteers will be clearly indentified by Red Cross vests or bright yellow shirts. Fire Department personnel will be in the area to answer questions if they arise. Together, we can save lives and make Hiawatha an even better place to live!


