# **HEDCO** "State of the City" 2019-Making A Difference

The Hiawatha Economic Development Corporation (HEDCO) hosted a luncheon July 18 for Hiawatha businesses, which featured a presentation and panel about the past year's progress. Kyle Kunz, HEDCO Board of Directors Chair, explained the successful timeline of Hiawatha's new partnerships and developments from July 2018 to June 2019.

As a growing community, HEDCO and the City welcomed eight new partnerships and six ribbon cuttings for new Hiawatha businesses and expansions. In fact, five of Corridor Business Journal's fastest-growing companies were Hiawatha businesses: Crystal Group, Channel Fusion, Mobile Demand, Boomerang Corporation, and Wickwire Chiropractic.

In addition to business growth, construction development allows Hiawatha to be easily accessible, as well as develop as a community. Hiawatha can look forward to the Tower Terrace Interchange alleviating traffic congestion at Boyson Road and the economic growth around that interchange. In addition, there is the development of the new Hiawatha Village Center, as well as the Hiawatha Public Library's renovation and expansion. Over a three-year period, economic development has centered



around Tower Commerce, Peck's Landing, Longfellow Square and Sherman's Addition.

# **HEDCO** presented the following statistics regarding the City's growth:

- 629,996 square feet of new commercial property
- \$78M added property value
- 479 full-time employees; 132 retained
- 125 part-time employees; 25 retained
- Completed APA Awarded Comprehensive Plan 2036
- Hiawatha Population Growth-2010 grew by 8%; 2020 projections 12%
- 39% increase in permit fees since 2015
- Lowered property tax levy by .42 over a period of two-fiscal years.

- Dell Ridge 34 lots; 60% constructed
- Rolling Prairie 102 lots; 30% completed

Workforce development efforts included Hiawatha being named as one of 22 Home Base Iowa Communities (HBI). Serving our veterans as they have served us, Hiawatha supports HBI by connecting veterans with employers. Transitioning from being a soldier to a civilian is already difficult enough, so HBI partners help alleviate that stress by helping veterans find jobs that are suited to their strengths.

Economic Development Forecast Panel consisting of developers; Joe Ahmann, Jon Dusek and Pat Callanan along with Mayor Bennett highlighted the city's holistic approach to economic development- interchange advantages, smart planning vision, and investment in aesthetics are all pluses for the city of Hiawatha.

The city's community development director spoke of the city's recent Robins Road Corridor Study for redevelopment along with these next steps:

- Redevelopment of Robins Road and potential expansion of an multi-mixed use corridor
- As a part of the vision, a master plan redevelopment, both private and public, including roadway and pedestrian facility improvements
- Future Hiawatha Main Street

Supporting new businesses and being veteran-friendly is only the beginning of working in Hiawatha.

Being connected to I-380, having a supportive community and providing a stable, growing workforce are not only perks, but promises for working and living in Hiawatha.

# A Few Things to Know About the 2019 Election

The City of Hiawatha has three council seats and the mayor seat to fill for the 2019 election. Candidates for office must complete a Nomination Petition with no less than <u>25</u> signatures and an Affidavit of Candidacy form. Nomination Petitions and Affidavit of Candidacy paperwork must be filed with the Linn County Auditor/Elections Services Department.

# **Neighbor Complaints**

The City of Hiawatha has tracked 486 complaints since February 2016 in our on-line portal for permitting and code enforcement. In examining the list, most complaints are tall grass, garbage and sidewalk issues. In fact, more than 50% of the complaints are specific to sidewalks in the winter and tall grass in the summer. These are two maintenance issues easily seen from the right-of-way, as well as two critical issues that affect our neighbors and the community as a whole.It is a matter of public safety and



convenience that we maintain sidewalks. The regular maintenance includes keeping the sidewalks clear of debris, snow, and ice. When registering a complaint regarding snow, please keep in mind that owners are given 24 hours to comply after a weather event. However, extensions can be given for multiple successive storms. Maintenance also includes repairing sidewalks that have deteriorated to a point of causing a trip hazard. The standard for sidewalks are found in our Hiawatha Ordinance Chapter 136 which delineates the defects classified as hazards. This inscludes vertical separations, large gaps, holes and severe slopes. If the city receives notice of a trip hazard, we verify the location, inspect for the hazard, and request the property owner to take action. The correction process may take up to 90 days, depending on severity and availability of resources. Tall grass is defined as a nuisance when it exceeds eight (8) inches and includes more than just miscellaneous trimming. At the first tall grass violation on a given property, the owner is given an opportunity to mow the lawn. Subsequent violations at the same property may allow the City to mow the lawn and assess the owner without giving additional notice. If your neighbor has a sidewalk that needs to be shoveled, or a lawn that needs to be moved, being a good neighbor may include assisting them before making the complaint. Your actions help create a more beautiful Hiawatha in more ways than we know!



**REMINDER:** Posting a complaint violation on your neighbor is an option for addressing a nuisance. The information is limited to the location and the nature of the complaint. # Hiawatha Public Library Construction Project Update

As we move through the summer you have seen an increasing amount of activity at the Hiawatha library construction site. The focus of attention for the past three (3) months has been preparation of the site for new construction, including the completion of the east parking lot, underpinning the existing library, shoring, soil stabilization, earth removal for the new addition. Rain has certainly slowed down construction progress, but the sun has been on our side lately.

Justin Electric and Alliant Energy have completed the work for the temporary power switch over and the transformer relocated. Second Avenue, just north of W. Willman Street, has been closed for storm water and sanitary improvements. Dewatering has become complicated with needed adjustments in the field. Concrete footings and foundation walls to follow in the month of August where the contractor will prepare to change gears and start constructing the core of Phase I-new addition. # **Open Burning in Town**

With a few exceptions, open burning is prohibited inside the city limits of Hiawatha. Both Linn County and Hiawatha have ordinances governing open burning; the primary concerns are safety and air quality. The burning of trash and burn barrels are specifically prohibited and burning can result in an administrative fine. Certain types of burning, like restorative prairie burns or training burns are allowed with a permit from the Fire Department and Linn County Public Health. Many of us enjoy having a campfire on cool fall nights. Campfires and recreational fires are allowed. However, the Fire Department has the authority to order any open fire to be extinguished if they deem it unsafe.
