Severe Weather and Tornado Safety

Now that the worst of winter is behind us, it usually means the worst of spring is just ahead. The arrival of warmer weather also means the arrival of tornados. For those of us in Iowa, tornado season occurs between March and October, and while there is little you can do to prevent damage from a tornado, you can save your life by knowing what to do!

Watch vs. Warning

A severe thunderstorm **watch** means that severe weather is possible. A severe thunderstorm **warning** means that severe weather is in the immediate area. In either case, listen to the radio or television for updates. A tornado watch means that present conditions could produce a tornado. A tornado warning means that a tornado has been sighted, and that you should seek shelter immediately. The National Weather Service can alert the public to the potential of severe weather more efficiently than ever. Stay tuned to the radio or the Weather Channel for updates. If your neighborhood is threatened by a tornado, severe weather warning sirens will activate (these sirens are tested on the first Wednesday of every month at 9 a.m.).

Know where to go

If a tornado has been sighted, take cover in the safest place possible. A basement is always the first choice. Your options include: Building with a basement: Go to the basement. Stay away from windows and chimneys. Hide under the stairs or heavy furni-

ture. Cover your head.

Building without a basement: Go to the lowest level in the central portion of the building. The first choice is an interior closet or hallway, away from windows. Cover your head. In all cases you should have a flashlight and a battery operated radio with you. Keep your keys with you - they can disappear in a tornado.

Shopping center or large building: Look for a pre-designated shelter. If you don't see one, go to the middle hallway on the low-

est level. Cover your head.

Mobile home or car: Leave at once and find shelter in a building. If there is no shelter nearby, lie flat in the nearest ditch, ravine, or culvert with your hands over your head.

Following these steps can minimize the possibility of death or injury during severe weather. Share these tips with your family, and practice a tornado drill in your home this week.

NOTICE TO WATER CUSTOMERS:

Due to capital improvements and inflationary costs of operations and maintenance; The Hiawatha Water Board of Trustees is proposing to raise the minimum water charge \$2.00 with a 4% increase for capital improvements and 3% increase for inflationary expenses.

This proposed increase has been based upon the completion of a rate study that looks at our overall projection of future expenses. The Water Board will set the new water rates at the July Water Board meeting. 

ECICOG Housing Rehabilitation Program Project

What can I do with this grant?

The Linn County Housing Rehabilitation program is offering a grant of \$6,000 for most types of repairs, including emergency repairs, exterior repairs and residential accessibility. Some examples of eligible projects include roofing repairs, window replacements, and handicap accessibility. Assistance is provided in the form of a five-year forgivable loan that recedes at a rate of 20 percent per year.

Who can apply?

If you live in Linn County (and <u>NOT</u> within the City Limits of Cedar Rapids), own your home and meet the income requirements (listed below), please apply. Interested candidates can request an application from the East Central Iowa Council of Governments at 319-365-9941, ext 124.
