


Let's Get an Accurate Count for 2020

The census gathers so much more than population figures. Our count impacts things like federal funding, resource distribution, political representations and business decisions, while also providing valuable statistics. The 2020 census is important to the city of Hiawatha and all our residents; it is in our best interest to get an accurate count of our community.

The census has been conducted every 10 years since 1790. Census data determines how the \$600 billion in annual federal funding is distributed to states and communities for infrastructure and roads projects, health care, schools, and more. An accurate count ensures that states and communities get the resources they need to serve our residents, including Medicaid and school lunch programs. For Hiawatha, its RISE-State Roadway Grant funding,



Housing Rehabilitation Programs, emergency management planning, Corridor Metropolitan Planning Organization funding we utilize for road, trail and transit funding, and much more.

Businesses use census data to make decisions about where to open a business or expand operations. Cedar Rapids Metro Economic Development Corporation, Linn County, the City of Hiawatha and other metro communities rely on census data, as well, to analyze the health of our business community and help tell the stories of our community to the rest of the world.

A state's political representation at the federal level is impacted by census data. Representation in the U. S. House of Representatives and the Presidential Electoral College election system are both determined by census counts. Iowa has steadily lost a member of Congress over the years due to population decline. In 1910, Iowa had 13 members of Congress representing Iowa's interests in the U.S. House of Representatives. Today, Iowa only has four.

Our country's Electoral College system to elect the president is determined by adding the number of Senators each state has - each state has two - with the state's number of representatives in the U.S. House. That leaves Iowa with six votes in presidential elections. It is easy to see how accurately counting every person is vital to our state's interests being heard on the federal level.

Census Day is April 1, 2020. By that date, households will receive an invitation to participate in the 2020 Census. You'll then have three ways to respond: online, by phone, or by mail. This marks the first time you can respond online, making it easier than ever.

Hiawatha City Council Approves Street Projects

Design Underway for 12th Avenue Resurfacing

The City Council approved a contract with MSA Professional Services to start the design work for a resurfacing project on 12th Avenue from Blair's Ferry Road north to Lyndhurst Drive. Because the pavement shows signs of distress, the first phase of the project is to analyze and review different rehabilitation methods based on cost factors, design life, and industry recommendations. The study resulted in the selection of a "crack and seat" method with a new asphalt overlay as the most cost-effective method to restore the pavement surface. The design plans are being prepared which will include the overlay process along with the reconstruction to the existing sidewalk ramps at six intersections to restore the ramps to the current ADA standards. Also being developed is a staging plan to hopefully reduce disruptions as much as possible to neighborhood traffic.

The plan calls for a public open house to provide information to residents, which is scheduled for **June 20**, 5:00 PM to 7:00 PM, in the multi-purpose room, on the lower level of City Hall. Notices for this meeting will be mailed to those living within 500 feet of the project slope. A notice will also be posted on the Hiawatha website at hiawatha-iowa.com.

Hiawatha Approves Contract for New Traffic Signal at Center Point Road and Willman Street

The City Council also approved a contract with Shive Hattery Engineers to prepare plans for a new signal at Center Point Road and Willman Street. The new signals will replace the existing 4-way stop installation with signals that will be actuated by pedestrians or side street traffic. The project has been bid with the goal is to have the new signals installed by late summer. Visit the city's website to view a virtual tour of the new intersection.

New Street Proposed for Midtown Development

The City Council has authorized moving ahead with the extension of Midtown Drive adjacent to the new Midtown Development scheduled to start construction later this year. This development will be a mix of residential units, senior living, live/work, retail, and commercial buildings that will be made available through phased construction over the next five to six (6) years. The new street extension will connect Robins Road with the extension of "A' Avenue to the existing Clark Street. For questions, contact the City Engineer at jbender@hiawatha-iowa.com.

ATV Made Possible by Firehouse Subs Grant

Firehouse Subs awarded the Hiawatha Fire Department with a \$13,407 grant, which allowed the department to purchase an all-terrain vehicle (ATV). The vehicle was displayed May 4 at Firehouse Subs.

The new vehicle will allow firefighters to provide firefighting, medical support, and execute search and rescue mission in areas impassable by traditional emergency vehicles, such as on trails.



Backflow Prevention Devices Must Be Checked Annually

It's that time of the year for lawn irrigation systems to be put on line for the season. If you are a customer who has a lawn irrigation system or a commercial building, then you have a backflow prevention device such as the one shown in the photo to the right.



As part of the International Plumbing Code, each backflow prevention device must be checked yearly to ensure the device is functioning properly by a certified tester. Once the test is completed the device can be put into service and a copy of the paperwork must be sent to the Water Department Office verifying the proper test was completed, in addition, noting any deficiencies, and/or any repairs completed. Emerald Ash Borer Confirmed in Hiawatha

A destructive insect of ash trees has been confirmed in Hiawatha. The emerald ash borer (EAB) was discovered at Guthridge Park near the tennis courts on May 16 by City staff and has been confirmed by the ISU Plant and Insect Diagnostic Clinic. There are now 61 counties in Iowa confirmed positive with this invasive pest. EAB has spread to 35 states destroying tens of millions of ash trees.

EAB is a metallic-green beetle that measures approximately ½ inch long. The immature stage of the insect feeds on the inner bark of ash trees, disrupting the trees ability to transport water and nutrients.

EAB infested ash trees include thinning or dying branches in the upper canopy, evidence of woodpecker activity, S-shaped feeding galleries under dead or splitting bark, D-shaped exit holes, and water sprouts (along the trunk and main branches).

Since the completion of the 2016 Hiawatha tree inventory, the City has taken a proactive approach in removing infested ash trees on public property.




New Hours for 2019! The Hiawatha Farmers Market will be held every Sunday, 10 am to 1 pm, Rain or Shine!


