Hiawatha City Council approves largest infrastructure investment in City's history

On Wednesday, March 6, 2019 the Hiawatha City Council approved a plan to bring more housing and retail options to Hiawatha. The \$72 million project, called Hiawatha Midtown, represents the largest private investment in the city's history, and will create a walkable residential, retail and entertainment district that will serve as the city center - "the Heart of Hiawatha."

Keith Billick, a designer with Side By Side, LLC who is leading the project, says the large-scale development, to be completed in phases over a five-year period, will add a diverse mix of attainable housing to the city to accommodate a growing population.



"Great urban design drives economic development," said Billick. "Hiawatha Midtown has the potential to connect a growing number of residents with small and mid-size businesses that make a big impact on the local economy."

Housing will feature a mix of apartment, condos, townhouses, a senior living community and single-family bungalows. Central to the plan will be flexible live-work spaces that allow small business owners to combine some of their personal and business expenses, a strategy shown to increase the success rate of start-ups.



While the architecture and design of Hiawatha Midtown will offer a more contemporary feel, extra attention will be paid to ensure the development compliments the existing character of its surroundings.

"It was important to us that the project feels like a natural fit for the area," said Billick. "We want to tap into the potential that already exists and build off the things residents want to see in their neighborhood."

According to Billick, adding attainable, attractive housing and business space is just the beginning. Pedestrian and bike-friendly trails and sidewalks will better connect residents with local businesses. Plans are also in the works for green spaces to beautify the city and provide a place for socialization and outdoor recreation.

The Final Touch of the Village Center Concept will be completed by PAKAR Management, LLC

The developer anticipates construction of the minimum improvements will require an investment of not less than \$4 million. It will be 12,500 square feet of commercial/mixed use with office space, restaurant, and condo living opportunities. This development will sit on the northeast corner of the Emmons Street/Robins Road/Center Point Road Intersection fronting Hawkeye Communications/Banacom.



Iowa DOT Holds Rescheduled Public Hearing February 28, 2019

The Iowa Department of Transportation held a public hearing Thursday, February 28, 2019 to discuss the proposed improvements to I-380 between Collins Road/Iowa 100 and County Home Road, which includes six-laning I-380, rebuilding the Boyson Road Interchange and adding an Interchange at Tower Terrace Road.

The public hearing was rescheduled from the January date because of adverse weather conditions. Iowa DOT staff discussed the project and was followed by a question and answer session. The purpose of the proposed improvements is to accommodate

increased travel demands in the I-380 corridor between Collins Road/Iowa 100 to County Home Road. In order to meet increased travel demands in the project area, the proposed improvements are expected to:

- Accommodate future traffic growth
- Improve traffic operations at ramp terminals and on I-380
- Support planned economic development and land uses.
- About a 100 people were in attendance with only positive comments being said.

Tower Terrace Road Corridor Management Plan Finalized

The Metropolitan Planning Organization has completed the final draft of the Tower Terrace Roadway Corridor Management Plan update. The plan will be considered by the full Policy Board in March of 2019. This new roadway from the new I-380 Interchange to Highway 13 east of Marion will provide a safe, efficient, and aesthetically appealing transportation route for many years to come.

Library Renovation and Expansion Project Bid Letting

Bids for the library renovation & expansion project were received on Tuesday, February 26 at 10:00 AM. Bids were opened in the council chambers at 10:30 AM. A total of eight (8) bids were received; base bids ranged from \$4,732,893-\$3,884,000. Our base bid estimate was \$3.7M. The lowest responsible bidder was Garling Construction Inc. with \$3,884,000. The base bid is 5% over the estimated building construction. The contingency is set at 12%. There were a total of 12 alternatives that consist of pluses and minuses that were assessed and stay within the 12% contingency keeping us within our total project cost of \$4.2 million.

The Library Board of Trustees reviewed bids and officially awarded the contract to Garling Construction Inc. at their regular meeting on March 12 at 7:00 PM. The contract will be completed in two phases with the library staying open the entire time of construction.

The first phase consists of substantially completing the addition. The second phase will commence after we relocate from the existing space to the addition. The second phase consists of demolition and renovation of the existing space. The duration of the work is estimated at fourteen (14) months. Construction work is anticipated to begin as weather permits.

Legislative Day 2019

Throughout the year, your City Council, Mayor and staff met with our district's legislator to discuss issues and opportunities within the district. Each year brings new legislation along with different opinions on each side of the aisle. In each session there are bills written from both the senate and



house side; some of those bills make it out of committee and some are held back for next years funnel.

There are many important topics and the one at the top of the list for discussion was HSB165 - Property Tax. The current version of HSB165 replaces the existing regular general fund property tax levy (known as the \$8.10 levy) with a new formula that sets a maximum amount. The dollar amount generated by the old \$8.10 levy structure would be frozen with the addition of an inflationary measure currently defined by the percent change for the two most recent years in the median family income in the Midwest census region as determined by Federal Reserve Economic Data (FRED). This bill has more in content with the Senate's property tax proposal not yet released.

The first Legislative funnel is March 8, making all legislation subject to the funnel a high priority.

The Importance of Flushing Water Lines

If the Residents of Hiawatha notice the Water crew working at fire hydrants and see water running into the street, you may think that the Department is ignoring its own philosophy on conserving water. The process of periodically "flushing" fire hydrants, however, is an important preventive maintenance activity. Although it may appear to waste water, this process is part of a routine maintenance program necessary to maintain the integrity of the water system and to continue to deliver the highest quality water possible to our customers.

Flushing the water system on a routine basis removes sediment from lines and keeps the entire distribution system refreshed. Hiawatha Water Department maintains over 40 miles of domestic water lines throughout the City.

As a result of the flushing procedure, residents in the immediate vicinity of the work may experience temporary discoloration of their water. This discoloration consists primarily of harmless silt or deposits and does not affect the safety of the water. The water is still drinkable. If you experience discoloration in your water after crews have been flushing in your neighborhood, clear the pipes in your own home by running all water faucets for a minute or two. We also advise you to postpone doing your laundry until all internal pipes have been cleared.

This same philosophy of water line preventive maintenance is one that you should use in your own home. Your home's water heater should be drained and flushed at least once a year to keep it working efficiently and to protect the quality of water inside your home. Also, if you go out of town and there is no water use in your home for a week or more, when you return it's always a good idea to run all your faucets for a minute or so before using the water. This ensures that you don't use any stagnant water that may have developed in your home's pipes while you were away.

Starting approximately Monday, March 25, 2019 through Friday, May 3, 2019, weather permitting, Hiawatha Water Department will be flushing hydrants.

Spring is on its way!

Spring is almost here. The spring showers will be a welcome change from all of this snow and ice. As you shovel and remove the last remaining snow and ice on your walk you may feel a little better contemplating spring showers, blooming flowers and the aroma of mowing grass!

As we welcome the springtime, we are reminded of the "good neighbor" policies which protect the water sources. The storm drains need to be properly managed and protected because they lead to lakes, streams, and rivers. Storm water transports pollutants into our drinking and recreational bodies of water. So please help protect our water quality by following a few simple rules.

- Grass and weeds should be kept at 8" or less. The recommended grass length is 3". When your lawn is 3" tall, it allows water more time to absorb into the soil versus running into the street or onto the sidewalk and towards the storm drains.
- Grass clippings should never go into the street. This clogs storm and drains and affects the quality of our water.
- Direct downspouts away from paved surfaces. All drainage needs to be dispersed on your own property. This helps to prevent pollutants such as motor oil or detergent from entering our water sources.
- Control erosion on construction projects and prevent sediment from leaving the construction site.
- Maintain all detention basins, retention ponds, bio-swales and rain gardens to control washouts and to filter impurities from the water as designed.

Tree Trimming

This Spring the City will be conducting another round of right-of-way tree trimming. We have divided the City into several zones and this year we are doing the zone between 18th Avenue and 12th Avenue. We will have a contractor come in and trim all trees in this zone that do not meet the City code. Chapter 151.04 states that all tree branches must be at least 15 feet above the street and eight feet above the sidewalk. The contractor will only trim trees in the right-of-way, not trees on private property are the responsibility of the property owner. Property owners are encouraged to keep their trees trimmed according to the City code. For tree trimming and general tree maintenance information see the link below.

NO Alkaline batteries including AA, AAA, C, D will be accepted by the Linn County Solid Waste Agency.

NO latex paint or caulk & other non-hazardous waste, automotive batteries, antifreeze & appliances, glass, tires, yard waste/brush & clothing will be accepted. You may drop these items off at the Linn County Solid Waste Agency on County Home Road.

<u>UNACCEPTABLE ITEMS:</u> Controlled substances (such as) - Adderall, Vicodin, Demerol, Hydrocodone, MS Contin, Ambien, any sharps including syringes and lancets, liquids over 4 ounces, thermometers, rubbing alcohol and hydrogen peroxide.

Products should be left in the packaging the medication was dispensed in. This will provide a means of disposing of the packaging, contain and protect the medication in transit, minimize any exposure and is also one of the requirements of the transporter.







Household Rubbish:

- 1. **Broken Glass.** This must be placed in a plastic bucket or other suitable container. Windows and doors with broken glass will not be picked up.
- 2. Small Items. Do not place these on the ground. Use trash cans or plastic bags as containers. Mark trash cans with a red "X" if they are to be discarded.
- 3. **Large Items.** Other than doors or furniture, nothing longer than 4-ft. will be picked up. Please cut up railroad ties, plastic, lumber, carpet and

drywall in 4-ft. lengths and tie in a bundle. No large demolition project debris. Remove nails, screws and all hardware from all lumber, trim pieces, drywall, etc.

Pickup will begin April 29, 2019. Leaves and yardwaste must be in paper bags, placed curbside by 7:00 AM, Monday, April 29, 2019. The City will not pick up any branches larger than 12" in diameter and no pickup of tree demolition. Contact a tree removal service for disposal of tree demolition. All other branches should be spread along the curb to facilitate easier pickup. Do not stack them.

It is illegal to include any of the following in the curbside collections: Waste oil and solvents, batteries, deposit beverage containers, pressurized and LP tanks, cans with undried paint, <u>cardboard</u> and florescent bulbs. *Please contact Linn County Solid Waste Agency (319) 377-5290 for more information on these items*.

Height: 40' - 50'
Rate of Growth: fast
Preferred soil: acidic, alkaline and wet soils
Grows well in full sun
Fall Color: yellow-brown
Bark provides forage for browsing wildlife and also provides nesting and roosting habitat for various species of birds.

Wild Plum




Height: 10' - 15'
