## Safe Winter Driving Tips



- Clear snow and ice from all windows and lights—even the hood and roof—before driving.
- Pay attention. Don't try to out-drive the conditions. Remember the posted speed limits are for dry pavement.
- Leave plenty of room for stopping. Brake early. Brake correctly. It takes more time and distance to stop in adverse conditions. If your car is equipped with anti-lock brakes, do not pump brakes in attempting to stop. The right way is to "stomp and steer!"
- Leave room for maintenance vehicles and plows. The law requires you to slow down or move over when approaching emergency or maintenance vehicles, including snow plows, parked on the side of the road when they have their flashing lights turned on. If you approach a parked emergency or maintenance vehicle during a winter storm and decide to change lanes be extra careful. The passing lane may be in worse shape than the driving lane. There may also be a snow ridge between the two lanes. Avoid making an abrupt lane change. If approaching a snowplow, stay back at least 200 feet (at least 15 car lengths) and don't pass on the right. Snowplows plow far and wide—sometimes very wide. The front plow extends several feet in front of the truck and may cross the centerline and shoulders during plowing operations. Plows turn and exit the road frequently. On multiple lane roads, watch for snowplows operating in either lane. Snowplows can throw up a cloud of snow that can reduce your visibility to zero in less time than you can react. Drive smart. Never drive into a snow cloud—it could conceal a snowplow. A snowplow operator's field of vision is restricted. You may see them but they may not see you
- Know the current road conditions. Call 511 or log onto the Iowa DOT winter road conditions web page.
- Watch for slippery bridge decks, even when the rest of the pavement is in good condition. Bridge decks will ice up sooner than the adjacent pavement.
- Don't use your cruise control in wintry conditions. Even roads that appear clear can have sudden slippery spots and the short touch of your brakes to deactivate the cruise control feature can cause you to lose control of your vehicle.
- Don't get overconfident in your 4x4 vehicle. Remember that your four-wheel drive vehicle may help you get going quicker than other vehicles but it won't help you stop any faster. Many 4x4 vehicles are heavier than passenger vehicles and actually may take longer to stop. Don't get overconfident in your 4x4 vehicle's traction. Your 4x4 can lose traction as quickly as a two-wheel drive vehicle.
- Look farther ahead in traffic than you normally do. Actions by cars and trucks will alert you
  quicker to problems and give you a split-second extra time to react safely.
- Remember that trucks are heavier than cars. Trucks take longer to safely respond and come to a
  complete stop, so avoid cutting quickly in front of them.
- Drive with your headlights on.
- Go slow—especially when approaching intersections, off-ramps, bridges or shady spots. These are all candidates for developing black ice—a thin coating of clear ice that can form on the pavement surface that may be difficult to see.

## Town Center Project: Fact Vs. Myth from your Mayor

A few weeks ago, an article in a local newspaper about the Hiawatha town center project left some residents thinking that the city was ready to buy their homes and start building a new "downtown". Both thoughts are wrong. Please let me set the record straight.



#### **MYTH**

- Center Point Road, Robins Road & Emmons Street intersection is safe and is ok as is. There are no serious problems today.
- The City is going to buy homes within the Town Center Master plan map. Citizens asked if the city will use eminent domain.
- The City is going to build a new "downtown" Hiawatha.

All the decisions have been made regarding the Town Center Master plan project. Citizens will have no input.

#### FACT

- The Center Point Road, Robins Road & Emmons Street intersection needs to be re-aligned before serious problems happen and for the increased traffic flows.
- The Council has stated that they do not intend to use eminent domain and will only purchase properties that are needed for the intersection re-alignment project. No homes are needed for this project.
- Public tax money will be used only in regards to the realignment of the intersection. However, as a result of the re-alignment, there is potential for redevelopment of the surrounding area. This would be done through private developers using private funds and be privately driven which if done properly, could result in the developer asking the City to participate. City participation would be project specific and decided by future council(s). This then could become what some may call the "downtown" or the "Town Center".
- The council is still gathering ideas and facts. No decisions have been made at this time. The council has met with Dave Ciaccio, project consultant, regarding the realignment of North Center Point Rd, Robins Rd, Emmons St and the potential effects to the surrounding area

In anticipation of the possible redevelopment of the surrounding area, the council is looking at various development concepts in anticipation of future private development. This approach focuses on the development of the areas' aesthetics, it's infrastructure and building types and materials in an attempt to encourage coordinated development of this area.

Once the council has a few concepts on paper, they will plan on at least two (2) public meetings to share those concepts and hear the citizens input. Citizens will be notified through the newsletter, website and newspaper.

This project will not happen over night. The intersection re-alignment is just the first step and the adjacent area redevelopment is a project of such caliber that it will take many hours, conversations, fore-thought, citizens input and dollars before moving ahead.

I hope this answers some questions. Just one last thought. This is a long term project. At this time, no target dates have been set.



### Snow Emergency Alternate Parking



Parking on public streets in Hiawatha during a declared Snow Emergency (media announced) must comply with the following schedule:

1st Day, even-numbered calendar day: 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Parking only on the side of the street with even numbered addresses.

1st Day, odd-numbered calendar day: 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Parking only on the side of the street with odd numbered addresses.

2nd Day: Parking only on the opposite side of the street as was permitted the previous day.

These snow emergency alternate side parking rules do NOT supersede current parking restrictions.

Vehicle Impoundment: The Hiawatha Police Department is authorized to remove any vehicle that is parked in violation of the ordinance, or is parked on a public street in a way that causes a hindrance to snow removal. Owners will be fined and liable for towing and storage costs.
