

North Center Point Road Project Update

The closure of North Center Point Road (NCPR) at the CC&P Railroad, which began on September 30, 2013 and is part of the improvements to North Center Point Road, will continue until mid-November. The headache inducing closure has already allowed several beneficial improvements, which could not have been done with NCPR open. The most visible improvements includes the removal, replacement, and raising of the current railroad tracks, the installation of new, safer signals at the crossing, and the removal of the two lane portion of North Center Point Road, in preparation for widening. The unseen, below ground improvements include new storm sewer and crossing over and burying of the current utilities, increasing the beauty of the corridor.

Contractors began paving this widened area and removing the overhead utility lines beginning the week of October 28, 2013. The new trail and sidewalk running along both sides of the road

also began taking shape the same week and will provide citizens increased bicycle and pedestrian access to other trails and existing sidewalks within the region.

And, even though working with some of the utility companies has been much more a challenge than expected, we are still on schedule to open as planned in mid-November, thanks in part to the hard and quick work of other utility companies and their contractors. The landscaping and sod on the east side will be ready for this mid-November opening, however, the landscaping/sod on the west side of the road will be installed in Spring of 2014.

Access to the businesses along North Center Point is still possible, but we ask that drivers please follow the signage directing them to each business and to detours. The North Center Point Road, north of Fisher Rd., and south of Boyson Rd., is "open to local traffic only". Cyclists will have continued access to the Cedar Valley Trail, but are asked to walk their bicycles through the area of the construction zone due to the limited trail width and the presence of large construction equipment. Your cooperation and patience with this is much appreciated, and we look forward to a vastly improved North Center Point Road come later this fall.

Boyson/Robins Road Project Update

The Boyson Road and Robins Road intersection project is substantially complete and construction was accomplished under the project budget. The new traffic signals have eased congestion through the intersection during the morning and evening rush hours. The signals have also been effective in handling additional traffic while North Center Point Road has been closed for the railroad crossing construction. lowa Department of Transportation's (IDOT) Local Systems staff have completed their

field inspection and have no further comments. They have also completed an audit of the materials used in the project, finding no issues. The IDOT still needs to complete an audit of other contract documents, like the construction quantity and payroll records before signing off on the project.



Boyson Pedestrian Island and Trail Project Update

The Boyson Pedestrian Island and Trail project that began in the middle of September, was completed by the middle of October. The improvements include a new, wider trail on the south side of Boyson Rd., between 15th Avenue and the Boyson Square commercial park, a red-colored concrete crossing on Boyson Rd., to the new Kirkwood Regional Campus, and a raised median to safely protect pedestrians and alert drivers.

A side project also done at the same time, by Dave Schmidt Construction, is the new flag plaza at Guthridge Park, between 9th and 10th Avenues. The new plaza was designed to celebrate the donated flag and pole in honor of our soldiers and their dedication to our country. Plaques recognizing the contributors were also installed as part of this project and the dedication ceremony occurred on Thursday, October 24, 2013.

Thanks to all of the businesses, citizens, and users who made these projects a success.

Jeanine was born in 1962 to parents Vern and Marilyn McKenzie. While a student at Jefferson High School in Cedar Rapids, Jeanine began to help in the school library. Jeanine went on to attend Kirkwood Community College where she got her AA degree in Library Services. In the summer and after school, she worked as a volunteer for the Bookmobile for the Cedar Rapids Public Library and helped out in the children's department in the old downtown library.




After graduation from Kirkwood, Jeanine attended the University of Iowa. Still working summers on the Bookmobile, she graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree in December 1984. Jeanine then moved to the Washington, D.C. area where she got a job as a librarian with a law firm. A few months later, she took a position as Assistant Librarian with the American College of Cardiology in Bethesda, Maryland.

After six years, Jeanine was diagnosed with ovarian cancer. Three years later she died at the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics on March 22, 1994. Jeanine was 32 years old.

This is such a meaningful gift for the Hiawatha Library community in that it will start the library out on raising money for an expansion of the library on the present site. This donation will be used in some way to create a permanent memorial for Jeanine.

New Ordinances: Delayed, Deposits, Pawnbrokers & Health Related Science Professions

Three new ordinances went into effect during the months of August and September implementing regulations for service types of facilities, such as delayed deposit services, pawnbrokers and health related science professions. The City determined it was necessary to have standards in place for these types of businesses as a means to provide a safe and healthy environment for Hiawatha citizens and minimize potential objectionable side effects to surrounding areas containing residential, public and family uses.

City Council approval of Ordinance #753 on August 21st amended the Hiawatha Code of Ordinances Chapter 165 Unified Development Code by adding pawnbrokers and delayed deposit services as permitted land uses in I-1, Restricted Industrial Zoning District, and I-2, General Industrial Zoning District. Allowing pawnbrokers and delayed deposit services to locate in Zoning Districts I-1 and I-2, will put these businesses in an area with compatible uses.

Ordinance #753 also added a new section 165.24A outlining the regulations for delayed deposit services and pawnbrokers such as restricting these businesses from being located or operated within 1,000 feet of residential property, schools and child care facilities, churches, parks or recreational facilities, and other adult oriented businesses.

On September 4th, City Council passed Ordinance #758 amending Hiawatha Code of Ordinances Chapter 165 Unified Development Code by adding the permitted use of pawnbrokers and delayed deposit services in Zoning I-1 and I-2 of the Land Use Matrix, and a reference note back to Section 165.24A containing the regulations for these types of businesses.

The passage of Ordinance #754 on August 21st amended the Hiawatha Code of Ordinances by adding a new Chapter 124 Practice of Health Related Sciences. The provisions of Chapter 124 require all health related professions found in the state code including massage therapy, to be licensed by the State of Iowa. Chapter 124 also authorizes the Police Department to placard any building where an unlicensed health related practice is operating and the establishment will remain placarded until a state license is obtained or a legal use is established.

Snow Emergency Reminder

Our Snow Ordinance will be in effect when the National Weather Service (NWS) predicts a snowfall in which three (3) or more inches are expected. While the Snow Emergency is in effect, there is no parking on any city street. Vehicles found parked in violation of this ordinance will receive a \$25 parking ticket and/or be impounded. During overnight snow removal operations, vehicles found in violation on City streets will be towed. The Snow Emergency declaration will be given to all the local media including but not limited to: KGAN (Channel 2), KCRG (Channel 9), and KWWL (Channel 7). The declaration will also be posted on the City website, www.hiawatha-iowa.com. Your cooperation is appreciated. REMEMBER - Don't park in the street if:



The 24 hour (or less) prediction by the NWS is for three (3) or more inches of snow.

Three (3) or more inches of snow has fallen and/or your street has not been cleared.

Also, the City will NOT generally conduct snowfall clearing operations for a snowfall of less than two (2) inches. This policy remains unchanged from prior years.

Please remember: Sidewalks must be shoveled with 24 hours of the cessation of snow fall, clear snow from around fire hydrants that are near your property, check with your neighbors regarding snow removal and direct sump pumps and downspouts away from hard surfaces so that water doesn't build up and freeze, creating slippery conditions on driveways, sidewalks, or streets.
