# PROTECT YOUR WATER METER & PIPES THIS WINTER

### WATER MAIN BREAK INFORMATION

Here at the Water Department we know the importance of having water available when you open the tap or flush a toilet. We also understand the frustration you experience when the water is not present. It's that time of year for water main breaks to occur. The Water Department wants to make sure our residents know what to do when this happens. When a water main break occurs it requires the Water Department employees to close down several water main valves to isolate the main and control the leak. We do our best to nform our customers when a water main break occurs. Many times, these main breaks are an emergency or occur after hours and our customers are not aware of until water is not available

Rest assured, the Water Department employees will work diligently to find the source of the leak and correct the issue to reestablish water to your property in a timely manner. We appreciate your patience when a situation like this arises.

If you should see or suspect a water leak please report it to the Water Department at 319-393-5556. If it is after business hours, please contact the non-emergency Police Department number 319-393-1212. We will promptly investigate your concern

# As winter weather settles in, please consider these

- Ensure your water meter can be turned off in case of emergency. Turn your shutoff valve on and off a few times to confirm it is in working conditions. If the valve is inoperable, contact a plumber to make repairs.
- Eliminate drafts from rooms containing your meter or pipes. Seal cracks from cold air and cover draft-prone windows with plastic or insulation. Open cabinet doors under sinks to help circulate warm air near
- pipes. • Insulate water pipes that may be vulnerable to cold air drafts with wrap that contains fiberglass or other known insulating materials.

  - Cover your meter with a blanket or rug to protect Protect outdoor faucets by
    - disconnecting hoses and turning off any indoor shut-off valves to those
    - Always keep your home's temperature above 55 degrees, even if you are not home for an extended period.

The City of Hiawatha would like to ensure you know the parking regulations during snow and ice removal operations. Removing vehicles off city streets improves efficiency and safety for street crews and first responders. The City may declare a snow ordinance based on several factors, including snow, sleet, freezing rain and blowing snow. When this snow ordinance goes into effect, the following applies:

- No parking on a city street, alley, or city-owned off-street parking once the snow ordinance is declared.
- Once declared, a snow ordinance is in effect until the snow has stopped falling and City streets are fully cleared.
- When a snow ordinance is in effect, the declaration will be communicated through the following channels: • In the Latest News section of the City's website
- Text and E-mail alerts
- Via City of Hiawatha Facebook channels
- Via local news channels and radio stations

### **CONSTRUCTION UPDATES**

10th Avenue – LL Pelling placed asphalt on 10th Avenue from Blairs Ferry Road north to Eisenhower Road. Once driveway approaches, installation of sidewalk ramps and site restoration is completed, the road will be open to through traffic. All work is expected to be completed by November 1,

Fitzroy Road - Final grading and concrete paving started mid-October. Following the paving, the contractor will pave the driveway to the Well House as well as intersection improvements at Fitzroy and Forrest Meadow Lane. All work should be completed by mid-November, including site

Tower Terrace Road – Starting Friday, October 14, North Center Point Road was fully open to traffic. This includes the new roundabout intersection at Tower Terrace Road and N Center Point Road. In addition, Tower Terrace Road opened from the new North Center Point Road roundabout east to Robins Road

Tower Terrace Road will NOT be open west of the North Center Point Road roundabout as work still needs to be completed at the west end of the project. Barricades will be installed for westbound traffic. Drivers should use caution in the intersection and should not follow construction vehicles that will be headed west. The interchange on and off ramps will not be open until late spring 2023.

Trail Connections - A new sidewalk was added along the west side of Edgewood Road, connecting Wolf Creek Trail to Grey Wolf. Installation was completed by individuals from Water, Public Works, GIS, and Engineering departments, saving the City a considerable amount of money thanks to their help. Soon a rapid flashing beacon crosswalk will be added to safely assist walkers across Edgewood Road to Clark Park.


