Plans Advance for Hiawatha Dog Park

Linn County and the City of Hiawatha are progressing on plans for Hiawatha's first dog park. The proposed park will be located south of Boyson Road and just east of the Cedar Valley Nature Trail in Hiawatha.

On August 20, 2018, the Linn County Board of Supervisors approved leasing .72 acres of county-owned land to Hiawatha as

part of the planned dog park that, once complete, will be just under two acres. This is the first step in getting the land ready for a future dog park. Other work includes working with Linn County Conservation on a design that incorporates existing trees and creating green space for open grassy areas. Additional parking is also planned. Linn County Conservation owns the approximately 1.48 acres directly south of the planned park. This area is a high quality urban forest that currently is not part of the planned park area.

A completion date could take over a year with an estimated construction cost of \$100,260. In meeting the growing needs of our community, a partnership was formed between the City of Hiawatha and Dave Wright for the build out of the dog park. Between Dave Wright and volunteers, the estimated construction cost will be minimalized for the City of Hiawatha with annual maintenance cost of the park below \$2,000.

"The future Hiawatha dog park initiative is regionalism working at its best. It is inspirational to see government entities and the public working together for a common goal," Hiawatha City Administrator, Kim Downs said.

"We are pleased Linn County is able to help the City of Hiawatha advance its plans for a dog park and add to the quality of life amenities available in Linn County. We anticipate this will be a popular destination for area residents and their canine companions," John Harris, chair of Linn County Board of Supervisors said.



Robins Road Resurfacing Project Set for Bidding

The 2018 Robins Road Pavement rehabilitation project has been published for bids. This includes removal of the asphalt paving, reclamation of the stone base and placement of a new asphalt surface between the Bali Hai Mobile Home Park and Stonegate Court in Hiawatha. The notice of hearing and notice to bidders provides for bidding late August and construction starting late September or early October.

The plans and specifications include approximately 2,000 feet of asphalt street removal, full depth reclamation of the existing base with portland cement and a new four inch thick asphalt surface. There will be short term street closures while the work is accomplished, however detour routes will be established with signing provided for guidance.

Interstate Improvements Proposed for I-380 Holds Field Exam

In mid-August, representatives of the Iowa DOT, City of Hiawatha, City of Cedar Rapids and design consultants held a field exam to review a preliminary plan set for the project to widen I-380 to a six lane facility. The project area of I-380 is approximately five miles in length and remains a four lane divided interstate within the city limits of Hiawatha and Cedar Rapids. The 2014 traffic volumes on I-380 through this area are 44,000 vehicles per day (vpd) south of Boyson Road and 30,000 vpd north of Boyson Road with roughly seven percent trucks.

The intent of this project is to provide improved alternatives for I-380 between Iowa 100/Collins Road and County Home Road/Linn County Highway E34 in order to improve the safety and operations of I-380. The project will also provide the needed improvements at the Boyson Road interchange and a new interchange at Tower Terrace Road. In 2011 the Iowa DOT initiated an Interchange Justification Report (IJR) and Environmental Assessment (EA) for improvements at I-380 and Tower Terrace Road. Construction is scheduled to start in the fall of 2021.

Open Burning in Town

With just a few exceptions, open burning is prohibited inside the city limits of Hiawatha. Both Linn County and Hiawatha have ordinances governing open burning; the primary concerns are safety and air quality. The burning of trash and burn barrels, are specifically prohibited and burning can result in an administrative fine. Certain types of burning, like restorative prairie burns or training burns are allowed with a permit from the Fire Department and Linn County Public Health.

Many of us enjoy having a campfire on these cool fall nights. Campfires and recreational fires are allowed. The fire department has established rules for recreational fires. A recreational fire must be attended at all times, and the fire should be in a fire pit no larger than 36 inches in diameter. The fire must be 25 feet from any structures or can be 15 feet from your own, when covered with a screen. Only clean dry wood can be burned. In no case, is the burning of trash, leaves, grass, treated lumber, yard waste, or other debris allowed. You should have a means of fully extinguishing the fire and it must be all the way out when unattended. Finally, the smoke from your fire should not prevent someone else from enjoying their property, be a good neighbor.

The Fire Department has the authority to order any open fire to be extinguished if they deem it unsafe.

Smoke Detectors Save Lives

Smoke Detectors Save Lives. Yes, that is an old saying, but it's absolutely true. That is the reason that every fall, Hiawatha Firefighters volunteer to visit homes across the community to replace smoke detector batteries and help replace aged smoke detectors if needed. This year, the Hiawatha Fire Department has set aside an entire week to Caring for the Community by checking smoke detectors. Firefighters will visit homes by appointment between October 10th and October 14th. To make an appointment, call the Hiawatha Fire Department at 319-393-4180 between 8:00 AM and 5:00 PM Monday through Friday.

Recent statistics show that 43% of fire deaths occur in homes where there were no smoke detectors. Another 22% occurred in homes where the smoke detector didn't work. Usually because of lack of battery, or the detector was to old to function properly. The remaining 34% of fire deaths occur in homes with working detectors. Often, those who perish in homes with working detectors were unable to escape because of other factors, which could include incapacitation by alcohol or drugs, age, or physical handicap. It's important for households with people who are unable to respond to a smoke detector on their own to have an escape plan.

There have been many advancements in smoke detectors over the years. Watch for next month's column where we'll discuss changes in smoke detector technology and what type of smoke detectors you should buy.

Emerald Ash Bore Public Informational Meeting - September 25, 2018

The City will be holding a public informational meeting concerning EAB on September 25, 2018 from 6:00 - 7:00 PM. State District Forester Mark Vitosh from the Iowa Department of Natural Resources will give a short presentation and answer questions.

As many of you are aware the Emerald Ash Bore (EAB), which attacks and kills Ash trees, has been found in Linn County, specifically the Cedar Rapids, Marion and Toddville areas. Chances are very high that EAB is in Hiawatha, although we do not have a confirmed case.

Ash trees on private property are the responsibility of the property owner. The decision to remove or chemically treat trees on private property rests with the property owner. Property owners are encouraged to do their own research before making any decisions.
